REVIEW OF 30% OPEN REQUIREMENT FOR COMMON SPACES

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Purpose

The purpose of this Plan Review Guideline (PRG) is to provide clear guidance on the methods acceptable to achieve the 30% level of openness (communicating openings) in common spaces.

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1. Applicability

This PRG is applicable to SOLAS passenger ships carrying more than 36 passengers and SOLAS cargo ships.

3. Background

We frequently come across multiple spaces that are considered common to one another. While SOLAS is clear that the boundary between these areas should be at least 30% open to be considered common, it is unclear on what methods are acceptable to achieve the level of openness (communicating openings).

4. Reference Text

"...Smaller, enclosed rooms within a space that have less than 30% communicating openings to that space are considered separate spaces. The fire integrity of the boundary bulkheads and decks of such smaller rooms shall be prescribed in tables 9.1 and 9.2."

5. Guidance

With respect to the 30% open determination for common spaces, the Coast Guard expects that windows, louvers, and ceiling areas will not be considered as contributing to the 30% open requirement.

For Cargo Ships: sanitary spaces located within the pilot house are considered to be part of the pilot house and should be treated in a manner similar to Radio Rooms and Chart Rooms as described in note 'e' following Table 9.6.
